


Fig. 1 Typical Output Characteristics




Fig. 3 Typical Transfer Characteristics




Fig 5. Typical Capacitance vs. Drain-to-Source Voltage




Fig. 2 Typical Output Characteristics




Fig. 4 Normalized On-Resistance vs. Temperature





Fig 6. Typical Gate Charge vs. Gate-to-Source Voltage

Fig 9. Maximum Drain Current vs. Case Temperature




Fig 11. Typical Coss Stored Energy




Fig 8. Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig 10. Drain-to-Source Breakdown Voltage




Fig 12. Maximum Avalanche Energy vs. Drain Current






Fig 13. Maximum Effective Transient Thermal Impedance, Junction-to-Case



Fig 16. Typical On-Resistance vs. Gate Voltage




Fig. 18 - Typical Recovery Current vs. dif/dt




Fig. 20 - Typical Recovery Current vs. dif/dt




Fig 17. Threshold Voltage vs. Temperature






Fig. 19 - Typical Stored Charge vs. dif/dt












Fig 22. Typical On-Resistance vs. Drain Current










Fig 24a. Unclamped Inductive Test Circuit




Fig 25a. Switching Time Test Circuit




Fig 26a. Gate Charge Test Circuit







Fig 24b. Unclamped Inductive Waveforms




